4. Oxford City Council Reactive maintenance budget 2017-2018 update

- First round of grants for this financial year.
- Received nine submission, totalling £7,469.55. The ODFAA committee and OCC Parks discussed these and recommended seven submissions for ODFAA approval totalling £3201.05:

- Should be another round in Jan/Feb if still some reactive maintenance funds still available. Focus on composting, water harvesting, solar power, sustainability, building/site security + accessibility
- Over the past 10 years all 35 allotment sites have been invited to apply, including those who do not pay rent to OCC. This decision was taken some years ago to try to help sites which had fallen into neglect and thus raise the number of plots available across the city. ODFAA will review non-OCC-site access/insurance payments as part of the lease discussions. We hope to continue to work together.
- Reactive maintenance money historically available for grants but if work on trees takes most of it
 then little would be available for grants in the future. Several items that Associations are bidding for
 are really items that could/should be funded from Association funds in future

5. ODFAA Centenary Plans

- Phil Baker has worked tirelessly to go through both our archives and OCC's and we already have a draft for 50 years of history and several site/association histories.
- Lottery bid of £4,500 to fund publication and printing was unsuccessful. Feedback suggests greater pressure on lottery funding due to reductions in local authority funds.
- Individual Association contributions still needed from quite a few associations. East Ward,
 Cutteslowe and Bartlemas to <u>resend</u> to Phil.
- Any updated versions also to be sent to Phil by the deadline of the end of the month. A9
- All to contact their local ward councillors to ask for a financial contribution of ~£200 to support the publication to from their annual grant of £1500. A10
- When doing this it is worth stressing the value of allotments to increase involvement and integrations of Oxford's ethnically diverse population.
- It was suggested that although hard copy of publication will be 'illustration-light' we could consider adding these to the electronic copies that would be on the website and go out to members.

6. Allotment Competition

- ODFAA have not run allotment competition since 2016 due to lack of resources (people and time).
- ODFAA committee proposed a way of reducing the administration time by sharing it with associations. This is like a method first suggested by a competition judge some years ago. On this basis Tim Treacher and Ian Sheppard have agreed to manage a 2019 centenary competition.
- TT & IS, plus Tina Mould and Mike Kent, two previous allotment judges, have met and formed an allotment competition subcommittee for 2019.
- We will manage to fund the competition with bigger prizes, particularly the site prize, by reducing paperwork and only running it every 3 -5 years. Thus, more of the competition budget will be returned to developing sites and celebrating and encouraging good practice.
- Entry by sites requires a minimum of one plot in at least three of the categories:

under 35 years 35 to 64 years	65 to 75 years	older than 75 years

- Also category for small plots 2.5 poles or smaller.
- The Association winning the overall site competition, should receive the Alderman Knight Shield, and prize money of £300, with a runner up prize of £100.
- For 5 plot categories there will be winners and runners-up with prizes of £50 and £30 respectively.
- The overall individual winner of the competition, will receive £100 and the Challenge Trophy.
- Highly Commended certificates will be awarded to runners up in the Challenge Trophy section. It
 was noted that these are cheap to produce but are highly motivating to recipients, particularly new
 starters.
- Two judging dates 2nd week of June and 2nd week in September. Sites to be judged in both rounds.
- Motion to run the competition was passed unanimously by the meeting.

7. Oxford Flood Alleviation Scheme – flood channel plans

- NJ reported back from a recent meeting between ODFAA and our solicitor that we have engaged to
 assist in dealings between two Associations (Osney ST&NB and Spragglesea Mead & Deans Ham),
 the Environment Agency and OCC regarding the proposed Oxford Flood Alleviation Strategy. The
 Environment Agency have committed to covering all costs of the legal advice we require.
- It was noted that one likely consequence of the OFAS works would be to hold back water north of Botley Road so as to channel it into the top of the new bypass channel at Seacourt. While it is unlikely to increase the height of future floods it may impact several allotment sites in the area by taking longer for flood water to dissipate and drain away after the flood has peaked. Of the 2,700 allotment plots in the city over 1,000 of these are in the flood-affected area.
- WSS again reiterated the need for the Environment Agency to consider proper clearing and maintenance of ditches in the area to speed up post-flood drainage. We have asked for this to be incorporated into the revised 'Heads of Terms' document our solicitor is currently revising.
